FORTUNE RECOGNIZES EVERYAGE AS A BEST WORKPLACE 2022

veryAge has been named a Best Workplace in Aging Services™ for 2022 by *Fortune* business magazine. This year, EveryAge ranked 13th nationwide in the small/medium senior housing category. In 2020, the organization ranked number 19. To generate the Best Workplaces in Aging Services[™] list, survey responses are analyzed from over 140,000 employees from Great Place to Work-Certified[™] companies in the aging services industry. The 2022 survey responses indicate 82% of EveryAge employees affirm that it is a great place to work. This compares to an average U.S.-based company where only 57% of employees provided that same response. In EveryAge's survey, 91% of employees believe My work has special meaning and 87% of employees agree that Management trusts people to do a good job without watching over their shoulders. This growth in the 2022 employee survey acknowledges the ongoing efforts made to create an exemplary workplace.

Fast forward to 2012, when I began my current role as President and CEO for the organization, which was then named United Church Homes and Services (UCHS). At that time UCHS was operating 11 programs, including three continuing care retirement communities, six affordable housing communities, a childcare program, and a separate Foundation, plus the home office. On the same day that I officially assumed my new role, Carolina SeniorCare opened its doors as a Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE), providing services to older adults in Davidson, Davie, Iredell, and Rowan counties.



As of October 2022, the organization now known as EveryAge has been providing services to older adults for over 51 years - and it continues to grow. EveryAge now operates 16 programs made up of three continuing care retirement communities, seven affordable housing

n 2022, I celebrated two personal milestones in my tenure with EveryAge: On June 2, I celebrated my 25th anniversary being a part of this wonderful organization, and October 1 marked my 10th year serving as President and CEO. I am honored, humbled, and privileged to lead this ministry. Each milestone moment in my tenure has caused me to pause and reflect on how EveryAge has evolved over this period of time.

In 1997 when I joined the team at Abernethy Laurels (then called Abernethy Center), the organization's name was United Church Retirement Homes, Inc. (UCRH). UCRH was comprised of two programs: Abernethy Laurels and Piedmont Crossing, plus the corporate (home) office. We were poised for growth with plans well underway for the development of Lake Prince Woods. A focus on developing affordable housing through the HUD 202 program was also being realized simultaneously.

> communities, a childcare program, two Programs of Allinclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE), a Medicare-certified home health and hospice agency, an adult day health program, and the Foundation, plus the home office. During my ten years at the helm, in addition to the external growth of new programs and communities I've seen over the past 25 years, I have also had a front row seat to witness numerous expansion, renovation, and replacement projects throughout our communities.

> As I begin my 11th year leading this organization, there are no signs of slowing down. EveryAge continues to advance plans to expand its footprint and serve more older adults throughout North Carolina and Southeastern Virginia. We also recently held a groundbreaking on September 29th at Lake Prince Woods to begin construction on a new Wellness Center and renovations to the Commons area.

> When asked why I have stayed so long, my answer is simple. It's because of the people! Over the past 25 years, I have had the privilege of getting to know so many incredible individuals through my work, including residents, team members, the leadership team, the many volunteers who serve on our Boards and Committees, and business associates. The mission of EveryAge and the positions that I've held within the organization have given me the opportunity to make a difference. I am simply grateful to be a member of the EveryAge team.

BREAKING GROUND AT LAKE PRINCE WOODS

Plans for a Wellness Center and Commons area upgrade at Lake Prince Woods came a step closer with a groundbreaking celebration in September. This event further celebrated Lake Prince Woods' 20 years of senior living in the Hampton Roads area and harkens back to Lake Prince Woods' original grand opening, which took place on September 29, 2002. This project is made possible by Lake Prince Woods' recent capital campaign, which raised \$1,467,047 toward a two-phase initiative to update wellness-enhancing amenities and memory care services on campus. The total cost of the first phase is anticipated to be in the range of \$13.5 million while details of the second phase are still in development.
